## PROJECT POOCH

### A NEW LEASH ON LIFE

Founded in 1993, Project Pooch matches unwanted dogs, who might otherwise be destroyed, with incarcerated youths who obedience train and prepare them for adoption as family pets. The student trainers work with their dogs daily, and practice the principles of positive reinforcement and behavior modification. As the youth trainers teach their dogs, they learn themselves –

- to be responsible
- to persist when faced with setbacks
- to know they are needed
- to realize dogs don't care about excuses
- to be consistent and reliable
- to practice patience
- to know how it feels to make a difference

By managing their dogs, students learn how to manage their own behavior. They also earn school credits, develop good work habits, and acquire valuable occupational skills. The relationships, emotional support and mutual trust established between the trainers and dogs are pivotal to the success of the program. For some students and dogs this relationship is a first experience of unconditional love, and it helps them develop the self-confidence and hope they need to build future relationships.

At Project Pooch we do NOT receive any government funding so your support is essential to our program. Our major expense is spaying/neutering all dogs. Donations can also help to buy collars, leashes, brushes and dog shampoo, vitamins, dog food, blankets, towels, and cleaning supplies. Any donation, no matter how small, can make a big difference.

We also welcome professionals offering their expertise such as veterinarians, groomers, trainers, and presenters. Project Pooch also needs volunteer helpers to oversee fund-raising projects, to write grants, and to represent Project Pooch at events.
